Mike Ewall is the Founder and Executive Director of the Philadelphia-based Energy Justice Network, a national nonprofit supporting communities to transition from polluting energy and waste facilities to clean energy and zero waste systems. In 1996, he co-founded the Campus Coalition Concerning Chester (C-4), bringing together fifteen colleges campuses in five states to support work against environmental racism in Chester. He helped residents form Delco Environmental Justice in 2007 which quickly stopped plans for the world's largest tires-to-oil refinery in Chester. In Philadelphia, he authored the Stop Trashing Our Air Act which is poised to stop the city from burning its trash in Chester. In our region and across the country, he has led winning campaigns stopping numerous incinerators, power plants, a multi-state nuclear waste dump, a coal-to-oil refinery, a liquefied natural gas (LNG) import terminal. He is the author of the Zero Waste Hierarchy that is now used as an international standard and as the guidepost for Delco's waste policy. He has authored local and state clean air laws that have tackled existing and proposed crematories and various waste incinerators in Pennsylvania and beyond. 
Sarah Alessio Shea is Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Resources Council (PRC), a statewide nonprofit organization that envisions a PA where nothing is wasted. Over her 20-year tenure at PRC, she has coordinated regional electronics recycling and household chemical collections, diverting 3.4 million pounds of material. She also led the development of PRC's Act 101 White Paper, published in 2021, advancing statewide recycling policy. In her role, Sarah oversees PRC's staff and programs across Pennsylvania, ensuring effective implementation of environmental initiatives. She currently serves on the boards of the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania and the National Recycling Coalition.

DANIELLE RUTTENBERG

Danielle Ruttenberg is a trained glassblower, entrepreneur and mother of two young children. After graduating from Tyler School of Art (2006), she founded and operated DR Glass Design, a custom glass art and fabrication business from 2007 to 2015. Then, in early 2016, shortly after the birth of her first child, Danielle co-founded Remark Glass, a fully sustainable, low-waste custom glass studio located in the revitalized Bok Building in South Philadelphia. Combining art and sustainability, Remark Glass fulfills its mission of creating sustainable art and manufacturing practices by employing traditional glassblowing techniques to repurpose discarded bottle glass into small batch home accessories. Next, in 2020, Danielle and her team went on to form Bottle Underground, a 501(c)(3) organization committed to increasing their impact in waste reduction and generating jobs for the local community.

This fast-paced session will spotlight practical, low-hanging-fruit projects that are already making a difference – and that you can easily bring to your own community or get involved with right away. Hear from Deb Soutar and Karen Murphy of Penn State Extension's Master Gardeners about their innovative plastic bag recycling initiative that transforms collected bags into durable park benches. Steve Jacobs, Parks and Recreation Director for Concord Township, will share how the engaging "Bio Blitz" event helps catalog local species while building community appreciation for biodiversity. Sarah Newman and Carol Armstrong, Master Watershed Stewards with Penn State Extension, will discuss winter road salt testing in partnership with the Stroud Water Research Center – why it matters, how it impacts waterways in Southeastern Pennsylvania, and what residents can do. Joy Baxter will highlight successful, repeatable programs led by the Haverford Township Environmental Advisory Council, and Woody Kotch of Transition Town Greater Media will introduce the Green Wagon Project, a hands-on effort supporting community planting initiatives.

Steve Jacobs is the Parks & Recreation Director for Concord Township. He is a Certified Park and Recreation Professional (CPRP), park champion and advocate for sustainable land management. A previous supervisor with Philadelphia Parks & Recreation, Steve has over 10 years of experience organizing communities. He is a passionate, inclusive-minded, public servant who enjoys the work he does in the community. Recently, he took the steps to apply for and have Concord Township qualified as a Pennsylvania Bird Town. Additionally, in March, his department was awarded an "Excellence in Programming" honor at the Pennsylvania Recreation and Park Society's annual conference for their work with the Newlin Grist Mill on watershed education & preservation via the 'Race for the Watershed: 5K and Rubber Duck Regatta.' Currently, Steve's green-initiatives include a wildflower meadow conversion in a Township-owned open space, community tree plantings, and park clean-ups. Steve also sits on the 'Walk, Roll, Delco' Steering Committee.

SARAH NEWMAN & CAROL ARMSTRONG

**PENN STATE EXTENSION MASTER
WATERSHED STEWARDS**

Sarah is the Watershed Conservation Assistant at Brandywine Red Clay Alliance. In her free time, she also serves a Penn State Master Watershed Steward in Chester County and an active member of her local Environmental Advisory Council. Her love of the environment began as a child in Western New York where she played in the woods, camped with her family, and splashed in puddles. She brings the same passion to her work today, where she champions environmental stewardship across the region.

Carol L. Armstrong Ph.D. is a neuroscientist and neuropsychologist with six years in brain injury rehabilitation and 35 years in research, healthcare, and teaching within the University of Pennsylvania Medical School and Cancer Center. Observing the impacts of loss of biodiversity, climate change, and chemicals in the environment, she shifted her focus to watershed protection and restoration, and to supporting scientists in their work on water quality, aquatic species, and freshwater ecosystems. She trained as a volunteer in riparian buffer restoration and stream water quality monitoring with the Stroud Water Research Center since 2017. When Dr. Armstrong found exposed salt piles and concentrated flow of salt to streams in 2019, her concern about the salinization of our freshwater streams and groundwater has grown to both taking actions through reporting to and educating municipalities and gathering data on the High-Quality Pickering Watershed in which she lives.

Joy is a full-time volunteer implementing climate solutions in her Haverford Township community as chair of the Haverford Township EAC, local and wider Lutheran church, and the Clean Energy Co-op.

She grew up in Florida, earned degrees in Chemical Engineering and Violin Performance at Northwestern University, and went on to earn a Ph. D in Chemical Engineering at the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB). While there, Joy met her husband who does basic research on solar cells. Their home has had a solar installation for over ten years. During the pandemic, Joy became passionate about helping nonprofit organizations go solar. In addition, she loves to spend time with her family: playing games and traveling. She continues to play violin as concertmaster of the Lansdowne Symphony Orchestra.



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
